### PUPIL FREE DAY

On Friday the 17<sup>th</sup> of February, Stradbroke School participated in a highly successful Pupil Free Day. The focus was Mathematics – Numeracy - using mathematics manipulatives to deepen the students understanding of mathematic concepts. This is a major focus for the 2023 school Site Improvement Plan.

Over the past 12 months, the school has increased the math budget allocation to invest in more manipulative math materials, with a focus on Primary years. Numicon resources allow students to develop their knowledge of number, including fractions and decimals.

Through out the PD day, staff rotated through 3 study groups. Rachel Kennedy, (from Sky Rocket math PD), led staff through a process of how staff could use Numicon resources, along with other manipulatives, to develop students’ grasp of number concepts and how to incorporate hand on tasks into the newly written Department for Education (DfE) units of work.

Krystal Lawrie (Curriculum Consultant from DfE) worked with the JP staff on a new DfE initiative called ‘Maths Chats’, which focuses on students using the language of maths and provides opportunities for repetition and reinforcement. Primary staff further developed their knowledge of using manipulatives to solve open ended tasks and to teach fractions.

I led the third rotation to support staff to develop longer term curriculum planning and how to break this down into smaller units of work. Time was provided to allow staff to work in small groups to plan these units.

Since the PD leaders have observed evidence of teachers applying their new learning with students in classrooms.

During the year, Maths will continue to be a focus of staff professional development in staff meetings, year level professional learning teams and pupil free days.

### CORWIN – IN SCHOOL TRAINING

Research strongly shows that students’ understanding and engagement increases significantly the more they understand about the purpose of their learning and how they can be successful. In our classrooms we use the terms ‘learning intentions’ and ‘success criteria’ with students so they know what they are learning about. The Morialta Partnership primary schools (Stradbroke, Magill, Trinity Gardens and Vale Park) have continued our pedagogy project - evolving teaching pedagogy. This year, all staff have been involved in 2 hour workshops where they were released from their classrooms to continue to develop their skills in writing learning intentions and success criteria to engage students.

As the year progresses it is expected that teachers and students will be using this strategy consistently in lessons. We aim for students to be able to articulate the purpose of their learning and how they can be successful.

## EXTERNAL PROVIDERS AT STRADBROKE SCHOOL

An external provider is an organisation or therapist who is engaged by families, through the National Disability Insurance Scheme or through private funding, to work with their child.

Many families and external providers are requesting that the school provide facilities and times for students to leave the classroom and attend sessions with therapists. This is causing substantial pressure on space, timetables and teachers learning programmes, as well as the school's ability to provide appropriate duty of care.

The core business of schools is teaching and learning. Therefore it is essential that each child's education is the primary focus of their attendance and participation in school.

We ask that all families be aware that all external providers must ask for permission to provide services to students at Stradbroke School. The site leader is under no obligation to accept these requests and the decision will be made on a case by case basis.

The Department for Education requires extensive documentation and agreements to be reached prior to any non-department organisation being allowed to provide services within a school site. The external provider is responsible for providing this document to the school. Parents must also give written permission for services to be provided during school time.

Please ensure that if you are contracting a service provider through NDIS or privately that they are aware of the processes in place at Stradbroke. For further information, please contact the Front Office.

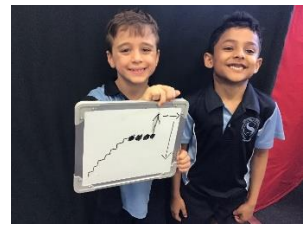

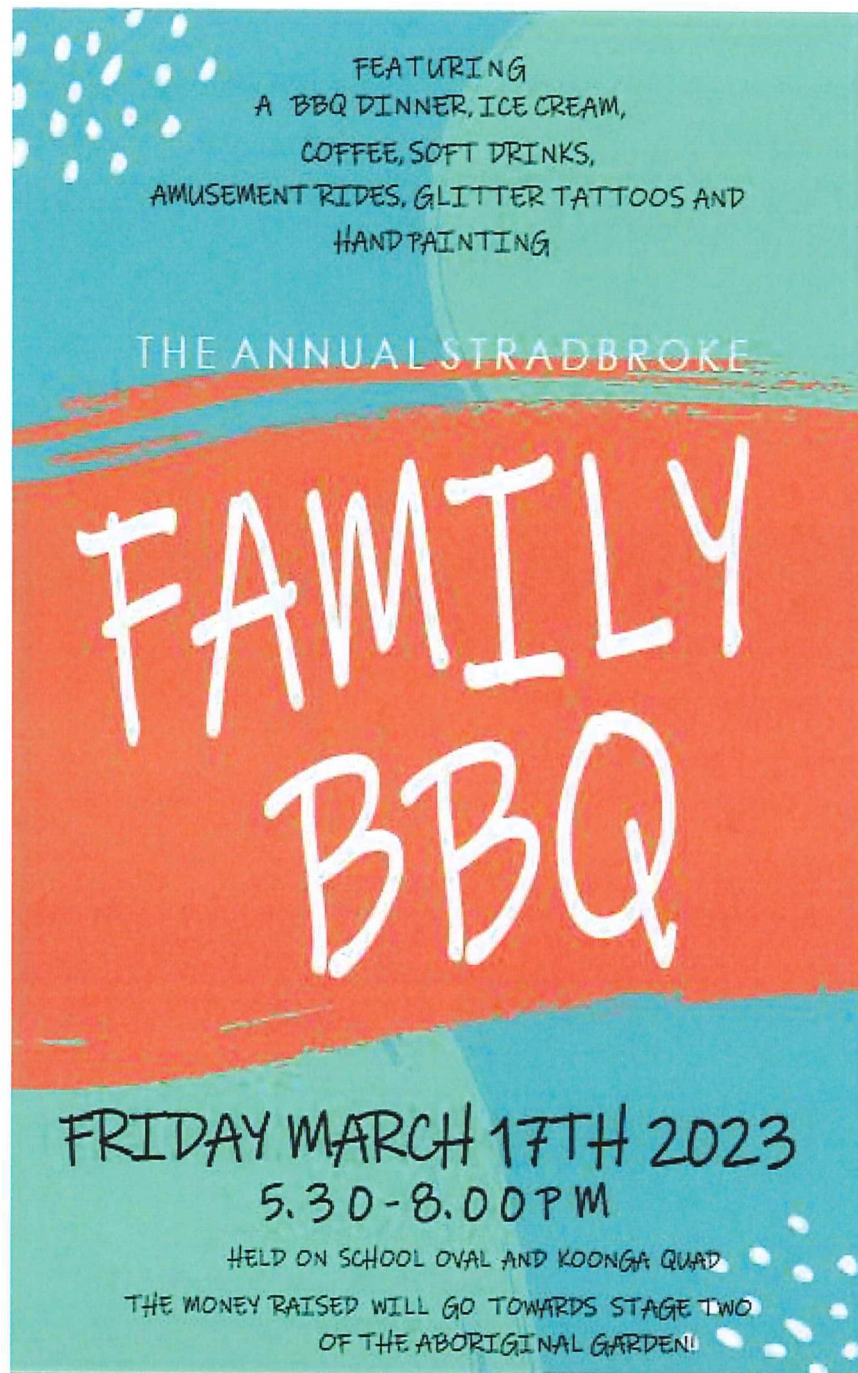

**When can I buy the presale vouchers?**

Presale of vouchers are available now until Wednesday 11th March at 9am. After this time the online sales will be closed so we can package up all the vouchers.

**How do I buy the vouchers online?**

You will use the Qkr app. When purchasing your vouchers please do so under the name of the eldest child in your family only. Vouchers will then be collated in a packet under the **family's name** to be collected on the night of the Family BBQ.

**Where do I collect the pre-paid voucher pack from?**

There will be a designated area for pre-paid voucher packs - please refer to the event map.

**Can I still buy vouchers on the night?**

Yes! There will still be voucher sales on the night from 5.30pm-7.30pm—these will be done with cash, you won't be able to use the Qkr app.

**How do the vouchers work?**

You pre-purchase vouchers either on Qkr or on the night then give them to the staff in exchange for food, drinks or rides. Vouchers are generic in that if you want to get 2 different soft drinks, when you go to the drink station you can then specify which drinks you want.

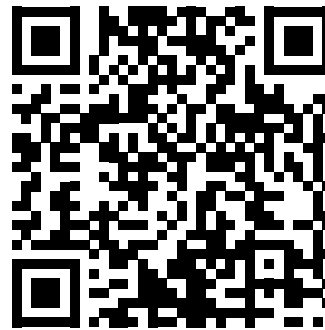

## ABOUT CHINESE (MANDARIN)

The history of the Chinese community in Australia extends back to the mid-1800s, and patterns of migration in recent decades have seen rapid growth in Australia's Chinese population.

Current links between Australia and China are characterised by bilateral relationships in trade and investment, as well as educational exchanges, and research and development in science and technology. The movement of people and ideas, as well as economic, cultural and educational exchange, adds to the richness and complexity of this relationship.

Chinese has been taught in Australian schools since the 1950s, and experienced rapid growth in the 1980s as China undertook a policy of open-door and economic reform. Chinese is recognised as an important language for young Australians to learn as Australia progresses towards a future of increased trade and engagement with Asia.

Chinese taught at the School of Languages refers to Modern Standard Chinese, Pinyin Romanisation and simplified characters. Given the ongoing use of both forms of Chinese characters (simplified and full form) in the media, in education and in environmental print (advertisements and shop signs), some knowledge or awareness of both systems is an advantage, for Chinese speakers and Chinese learners alike.

At the School of Languages the Second Language Learner Pathway (Reception – Year 10) caters for students learning Chinese as a second or additional language, however teachers will cater for all learners by making any appropriate adjustments to differentiate learning experiences for their students.

At Year 11 and 12 level, SACE courses are available at Beginners, Continuers and Background Speakers levels.

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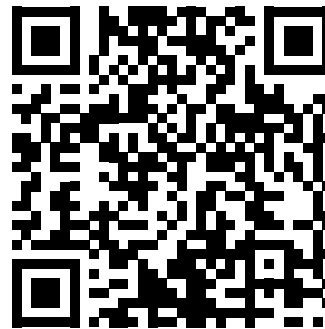

## ABOUT PUNJABI

Punjabi is an Indo-Aryan language spoken by 130 million native speakers worldwide, making it the 10th most widely spoken language in the world. It is the native language of the Punjabi people who inhabit the historical Punjab region of Pakistan and India.

Punjabi is the fourth most spoken language in England and Wales and third most spoken in Canada. The language also has a significant presence in the United Arab Emirates, United States of America, Canada, United Kingdom, Saudi Arabia, and Australia.

Punjabi emerged as an independent language in the 12th century. Over the years a rich literary tradition has been developed in the Punjabi language, which includes examples of heroic ballads, epic poetry, stories of romantic tragedy, etc.
