### **CLASS PLACEMENTS 2024**

The class placement process for 2024 is underway. It is a complex process that takes many weeks and many hours of teacher time to complete. Our enrolment numbers at each year level will mean that we will have composite classes (two year levels together for example year 5/6 or 3/4). Earlier this term we invited parents to share with us any specific information that may impact your child's class placement. For some families there is anxiety about placement in a composite class. Current research indicates there is no discernible difference in academic performance between composite or single year level classes. Composite classes are a practical solution to managing the varied enrolment numbers at each year level without creating that exceed the Department for classes recommended class sizes.

Please be assured that we take your requests seriously however it is not possible to meet every request. We use our knowledge and expertise of how students engage at school and in classes to make decisions for the benefit of all children. For reasons of privacy and confidentiality we may not be able to tell you why a particular decision is made however we can assure you that we spend many hours considering alternatives before making the best decision possible for all students.

# **GUIDELINES FOR BIRTHDAY FOOD**

Birthdays are a special occasion and are acknowledged at Stradbroke School in a range of ways such as singing happy birthday, receiving a birthday sticker and recognition at assemblies. Celebration in class varies according to the age of students.

Parents and students are feeling pressured to provide treats for the whole class. The frequency of treats being distributed in class is increasing and this makes it very difficult for families to manage the intake of treat foods for their children.

If parents wish for their children to celebrate birthdays with classmates at school they are requested to comply with the following:

- A small cupcake for each class member; or
- One small bag of Natural Confectionary Iollies (one Iolly for each child and the remainder of the bag to be taken home)
- No party/treat bags; and
- No additional treats

From time to time, parents may wish to provide a small treat for their children to celebrate their birthday with classmates at school. Parents need to negotiate this with their child's class teacher. No more than one or two birthday treats will be distributed within one week.

Treat foods distributed at school for birthdays have caused concern. Distribution of party food results in a loss of class teaching and learning time, and can become time consuming. Students with allergies and dietary requirements must also be considered.

# **EXEMPTIONS**

If a family holiday/travel is planned during term time of more than 3 days, a student exemption form (ED176) needs to be collected from the Front Office, completed and submitted to the Principal for approval.

For absences less than 3 days please notify the class teacher and the Front Office via the absence methods.

# EARLY MORNING ARRIVALS

Students are allowed to start arriving at school from 8.30am.

Students who arrive before 8.30am must be booked into Kids' Zone. Students who are on the school grounds before 8.30am will be taken to Kids' Zone and families will be sent an invoice. This is a duty of care issue as there are no teachers on duty prior to 8.30am.

Classooms will be opened at 8.40am and students may ente the buildings to put away their bags, talk to the teacher and get organised for the day. Music is played at 8.48am followed by a siren at 8.50am indicating that classes are commencing and all students need to be in their classrooms ready to start.

# **EARLY DEPARTURE**

If your child needs to be away from school during school hours or collected early, e.g. to keep a dental or doctor's appointment, <u>please send a message to the class</u> teacher in the first instance.

A caregiver is required to come to Student Services in the Front Office and sign your child out. Front Office staff will call the classroom and request the child to come to the Front Office for collection as parents are not permitted to go to the classroom. Please note children are not permitted to wait in the pick-up zone as it is unsupervised. On return, an adult must accompany the child back to Student Services and sign them back in. Please note recess is 11.10am-11.30am and lunch is 1.00pm-1.40pm.

Please organise to collect your child/ren before/after these times if necessary.

# TRANSITION AT STRADBROKE SCHOOL

Stradbroke School has positive connections with a wide range of preschools, child care settings and High schools so that transition into Stradbroke school and onwards to high school is smooth. We aim for staff to be well informed and have an understanding of each students' learning needs. During Term 4, leaders and teachers find out important information about the learning dispositions and needs of the children and families who will be joining Reception.

At Year 6, teachers and leaders prepare information to share with high school leaders through site visits, parent meetings and telephone conversations. There are opportunities for families and children to visit Stradbroke School during the year for Principal's tours. New Reception students' are invited to participate in an Orientation Visit whilst parents receive information about starting school.

At the end of Term 4, Year 6 students have transition visits to their various high schools to familiarise themselves with their new environment and staff. Students with additional needs may have adjustments to their transition experience which includes additional visits, staff meetings with external specialists (eg speech pathologists and occupational therapists) and student learning plans created and shared.

# **IGNITE** at The Heights School – **REGISTER NOW**





**IGNITE** is a specialist program for students with high intellectual potential. The Heights School is the official Department for Education school for gifted learners in the northern metropolitan area of Adelaide.

#### HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILD IS GIFTED?

The characteristics of gifted learners vary, however, many display some or all of the following traits:

- High levels of curiosity and deep levels of knowledge in one or more areas
- Excellent creative thinking and ability to problem solve
- Strong empathy and sense of social justice
- Highly developed sense of humour

#### HOW ARE STUDENTS SELECTED FOR THIS PROGRAM?

Initial selection for the IGNITE program is based on performance in the Australian Council for Education (ACER) Gifted and Talented Assessment.

#### WHEN DO STUDENTS ENTER THE IGNITE PROGRAM?

Students who wish to be considered for the IGNITE program sit the ACER assessment in Year 6 for entry into the program in Year 7. Entry does **not** occur at other year levels.

In 2024 Year 6 students are eligible to sit the test for a place in the Year 7 IGNITE program in 2025. The date and location of the test are:

Premier's Reading Challenge certificates and medals are being sent home next week (Friday week 6).


Well done to the **594** students who participated this year.

# Making children's birthdays special

Children's birthday parties seem to be getting bigger every year. But bigger is not always better when it comes to celebrating children's birthdays

There's no doubt a child's birthday is a special day. It's one day of the year when they legitimately become the centre of attention for their family and friends.

It's not just children for whom birthdays have significance. A child's birthday is also a milestone for mums and dads. Another year older means another year along the parenting journey and plenty of fond memories too.

Traditionally a child's birthday has been recognised with gifts, a family gathering, and perhaps a special treat with a few friends. Essentially it's been a relatively low-key family affair with parties to celebrate milestones such as fifth, tenth and thirteenth birthdays.

Over the last decade children's birthday parties have become an annual celebration; and they've become increasingly bigger events.


Where once a few good friends would gather; we are now seeing the emergence of the BIG party where everyone, or close to everyone, in a child's class gets an invitation whether they are close friends or not. **This Big Birthday Party Phenomenon** is interesting to say the least.

It's obviously beneficial for the 'birthday child' as the number of presents they receive increases astronomically. Somehow there is something not quite right about a child receiving twenty or more presents, not to mention the gifts from his or her family.

Having the whole gang along removes the special opportunity for celebrating a birthday with their closest friends.

I know many parents organise whole class parties to encourage friendships. However in wanting to promote friendships they may inadvertently be making it more difficult for kids to form





friendships as little differentiation is given between a good friend and a child in their wider social circle when invitations are issued en masse. Good friends need to be recognised as such.

Some parents invite the whole class so that no child is left out or feels disappointed. That's a great intention, but it removes the chance for parents to teach the 'birthday child' to be discreet when issuing invitations and to be mindful of the feelings of those that aren't invited. It also removes the difficult decision-making process of choosing whom to invite from a child, which can be a great learning experience in itself.

The Big Birthday Party Phenomenon places enormous pressure on parents to come up with something bigger and better every year. Backing up a BIG PARTY year after year is hard work.

If you are over the Big Birthday Party Phenomenon here are a few ideas to make celebrating your child's birthday special, keep the budget and your sanity in tact and incorporate your child's friends as well:

- 1. Alternate birthday parties with gatherings or sleepovers of a few friends (without presents) every two or three years.
- 2. If you have a party each year then consider matching the number invited with their age. That is, six year olds can have six friends and so on.
- 3. Identify the different groups your child is in and allow him or her to invite a small number from each group. So school friends mix with friends from outside school.
- 4. Involve children in choosing and preparing the activities, food and treats for their party.
- 5. If organising a BIG BIRTHDAY BASH is for you, then keep it for your child's milestones such as their tenth birthday.

Birthdays like a lot of things can get out of hand. It's probably better to aim for SPECIAL rather than BIG and that means surrounding your child by his family and close friends to celebrate his or her special day of the year.
